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From the Principal

At Tambo State School we value ourselves, each other and our environment by promoting quality education; honesty and respect; a safe & supportive environment; open communication; accountability & positive attitudes. The school offers a learning place for students from Kindergarten to Year 10. A focus on the use of data to inform explicit teaching and guided practice through co-operative learning promote an ethos of continual improvement, using this data, the school has dedicated itself to improving literacy and numeracy outcomes for students. These programs are supported by a number of visiting professional staff including a Guidance officer; Speech Language Pathologist; Physiotherapist and Occupational Therapist. Successful learning is framed by high expectations relating to responsible, respectful and safe behaviours. Sporting opportunities are available at school, interschool and representative levels; participation opportunities are inclusive of all students. LOTE is offered to students through distance education mode. Smart Moves has also been embraced by the school with Physical Education being integrated through subjects on a daily basis. The core learnings from the Australian Curriculum are complemented by extra curricula activities offered by experienced teachers & trainers including: garden club; art club; active after school communities' program; netball; football; tennis; swimming. The community has many active groups which support a range of cultural, sporting & educational interests. The school is regularly involved with the local council in projects that benefit both the school and the community. The Tambo Parents and Citizens Association is an active body providing additional resources and advice to the school whilst building a culture of community. Tambo State School has close involvement and sustained partnerships with the community in aspects of student learning and school relationships.

3. 2020 data was impacted by the COVID-19 health emergency. There were significantly fewer SDAs during the home-based learning period (the first five weeks of Term 2) compared to previous years.

Teacher standards and qualifications

The *Teacher registration eligibility requirements: Policy* (p.1) states:

To be eligible for registration, a person must satisfy the Queensland College of Teachers (QCT) that they meet requirements regarding qualification and experience, or have otherwise met the requirements of the *Australian Professional Standards for Teachers* (APST). A person must also satisfy the QCT that they are suitable to teach and meet English language proficiency requirements. All these requirements are specified in the Act and the *Education (Queensland College of Teachers) Regulation 2005* (the Regulation).

The qualifications required for teacher registration are successful completion of either -

- (a) a four-year initial teacher education program including teacher education studies of at least one year (e.g. a Bachelor of Education, or a double Bachelor degree in Science and Teaching) or
- (b) a one-year graduate initial teacher education program following a degree (e.g. a one-year Graduate Diploma of Education (Secondary) after a three-year Bachelor degree) or
- (c) another course of teacher education that the QCT is reasonably satisfied is the equivalent of (a) or (b). These are considered on a case-by-case basis.
